### **Item One (1) - Request for Remote Participation Option Pursuant to Government Code Section 54953(e)(2)(a)**

Action Taken: There were no Commission members attending the Commission on Disability meeting remotely. No action required by the Commission on Disability.

### **Item Two (2) - Multiple Agenda Item Public Comment**

Public comment was provided on the following topics applicable to the Commission's scope of work:

- Concerns about the lack of maintenance of the elevators at train stations and the impact on disabled individuals traveling to LAX, specifically mentioning an elevator outage at the Universal Studios stop.
- Commending the Commission's detailed meeting minutes.
- Multiple comments on accessibility of pedestrian facilities near the Scientology building on Fountain Avenue, and Scientology's beliefs negatively impact older adults and people with disabilities.
- Reminding the Commission of a request from June regarding a report from the City Attorney's office about prosecutions for public right-of-way violations.

The Department on Disability Executive Director, Stephen David Simon, clarified that the Commission had not formally requested a report from the City Attorney regarding public

right-of-way charges but would review past minutes and potentially agendize consideration of the action.

No action taken, information purposes only.

### **Item Three (3) - Approval of the Special Annual Meeting Minutes**

The Commission reviewed the August 2025 Special Annual Meeting minutes.

Action Taken: Commissioner Williams moved, and Commissioner Barrios seconded, the motion to approve the minutes of the August 2025 Special Annual Meeting minutes. The motion passed.

### **Item Four (4) - Presentation by Los Angeles World Airports (LAWA) on the plan for the LAX Automated People Mover Train System with an emphasis on accessibility for people with disabilities.**

Cassandra Heredia, LAWA's ADA coordinator, provided a presentation on LAWA's accessibility. Her key discussion points included:

- An overview of existing conditions at LAX for passengers with disabilities.
- The FAA Office of Civil Rights mini compliance review helped guide areas needing corrective action
- The APM aims to streamline the passenger experience, and that LAWA is ensuring all APM facilities and infrastructure are fully accessible, including pet relief areas and emergency blue phones.

Efforts are underway to ensure accessible programs and services, such as wayfinding apps and support resources, for passengers boarding the APM.

- The airlines' responsibility for assistance ends at the curb; LAWA is responsible for supporting passengers using the APM and its connecting facilities.

Commissioner Barrios inquired about the APM's implementation timeline, its coverage for all airlines, and the possibility of a physical tour for the commission.

Cassandra Heredia stated that the APM is expected to go live in the first quarter of 2026, and recommended reaching out to the government affairs office to coordinate a physical visit to the APM for the commission.

### **Item Five (5) - Review and Approval of the Commission on Disability FY 2025-2026 Work Plan**

The Commission reviewed items for inclusion in its FY 2025-2026 Work Plan, including objectives, action items, ad hoc committees, and presentations.

The Department on Disability Executive Director, Stephen David Simon explained the process of incorporating ad hoc committee recommendations.

Commissioner Hopkins clarified that the "Powers and Duties" section of the Commission on Disability FY 2025-2026 Work Plan is fixed by bylaws and not subject to amendment.

- Discussions for Ad Hoc Committee one, LA28 Games Support, included;
  - Removing the item about press release templates as it was previously completed
  - Amending the phrasing for "naming a street" to "Paralympic" instead of "Paralympics."
  
- Discussions for Ad Hoc Committee two, Disability Cultural Impact, included;
  - Revised objectives and action items from Commissioner Hopkins, including preparing letters to the Mayor's office recommending Atkinson Hyperlegible fonts as the City's primary font and the creation of a mural commemorating LA28 Games and the Paralympics.
  - A request from Commissioner Williams that the establishment of the Betty Wilson Humanitarian Award of Excellence be moved to the first bullet point.
  
- Discussions for Ad Hoc Committee three, Healthcare and Social Security Access, included;

- Renewing efforts to support a Mobile Social Security Disability Office, with a focus on submitting a recommendation letter to the Mayor.
- Discussions for Ad Hoc Committee four, Affordable and Accessible Housing, included;
  - An update from Commissioner Cabanban on their meeting with the Los Angeles Housing Department, noting positive cooperation for the upcoming presentation.

Action Taken: Commissioner Cabanban moved, and Commissioner Schlesinger seconded, the motion to approve the Commission on Disability FY 2025-2026 Work Plan as amended. The motion passed.

### **Item Six (6) - Department on Disability Executive Director’s Report**

The Department on Disability (DOD) Executive Director, Stephen David Simon, provided the following information as part of his Executive Director’s Report:

- Noted DOD’s annual review process with the Mayor’s office and vision and goals for the coming year.
- Noted DOD’s three long-term priorities, each with two to four "smart goals", including
  - Expanding citywide ADA compliance by 2027.
  - Addressing the Needs of Unhoused or Unstably Housed People with Disabilities.
  - Simplifying, coordinating and streamlining the customer service experience for constituents with Disabilities:
- Noted the City Council has asked DOD and other City departments to collaborate and draft a ‘Games Accessibility Plan’ which will be submitted to the “Games Community Advisory Committee,” and then brought before this Commission for public comment.
- Highlighted the following upcoming event:
  - 10/16/25 (Thursday): Disability Art Exhibition Ceremony
  - Location: City Hall - (West Steps)
  - Time: 9:00AM - 12:00PM
- Noted that during the City’s budget crisis DOD was set to lose 14 of our 30 staff. That number was reduced to four staff, in temporary authority positions through the end of the year. Also noting that one of the four transferred to another department.

- Additionally noted that the Mayor’s Budget letter and budget instructions from the Chief Administration Officer (CAO) will be released shortly.

Commissioner Barrios asked what DOD is doing to assist seniors with Disabilities since the Department of Aging for the City will be absorbed by the County, and requested we provide the public comments for the “Games Accessibility Plan” live-streamed on Zoom.

DOD Executive Director, Stephen Simon stated he would look into the options of live-streaming to get a broader audience. He stated that it was recommended that the City’s Department on Aging consolidate with the Youth Development Department, Economic and Workforce Development, and Community Investments for Families Department but nothing was finalized, and the Department of Aging is still a standalone Department for the City of Los Angeles.

No action taken, information purposes only.

### **Item Seven (7) - Announcements**

Announcements from Commissioners and City staff and requested agenda items for future Commission meetings.

- Commissioner Barrios announced the 1st Annual California Disability Caregivers Conference opened for registration. A free, 3 day Zoom Conference held on October 7th, 8th and 9th (Oct. 9th is for Spanish speakers), 9am to 1pm each day. - Commissioner Cabanban announced she attended the 2028 Games Regional Transportation Summit. She encouraged the Commission to work with Natalie Sparrow, Executive Accessibility Officer for Major Events for the City of Los Angeles to ensure accessibility requirements are implemented during the planning of Major Events.
- Commissioner Williams announced he will be absent for the next meeting.

No action taken, information purposes only.

## City of Los Angeles Commission on Disability

### **Fiscal Year 2025-2026 Work Plan**

The Commission on Disability provides a forum for the identification and discussion of difficulties encountered by Disabled persons in our society, and makes recommendations to the Mayor and the City Council on measures which the Federal, State, and local governments may undertake to assure that persons with disabilities may participate without hindrance in the life of our community.

#### **Powers and Duties**

1. Advise the Mayor, the City Council and the Department on Disability on the needs and challenges of persons with disabilities in the City of Los Angeles.
2. Hold public hearings at least once a year as a regular or special meeting to take testimony from persons with disabilities and others regarding issues impacting the lives of persons with disabilities in the City of Los Angeles, and report the Commission's findings and recommendations to the Mayor and the City Council.
3. Monitor the program mandates of the Department on Disability and make recommendations to the Mayor and the City Council on program and policy initiatives to improve the service of the Department to the Disability community and provide persons with disabilities in the City of Los Angeles a better opportunity and ability to pursue activities of daily living without discrimination.
4. Review and make recommendations to the Mayor and City Council on funding disability access for City programs and services.
5. Maintain active liaisons with Disability community stakeholders interested in the problems facing persons with disabilities.
6. Promote greater awareness of Disability culture, as well as civic and community engagement of persons with disabilities.
7. Investigate and report to the Mayor and the City Council instances of discrimination based on disability, as well as ableism and attitudinal barriers in

areas including housing, transportation, employment, recreation, public information, health and social services, civil and human rights, and legislation.

8. Perform specific studies and surveys on the needs of persons with disabilities when requested by the Mayor and/or the City Council.
9. Submit an annual report to the Mayor and the City Council on the activities of the Commission.

# Accessible Housing Program (AcHP) Overview

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### Affordable Housing

- Provides funding and partners with developers and social services agencies to build, preserve and maintain quality affordable housing
- Refers residents to the right resources so they can find the best fit for their needs whether they are looking for rental units or to buy a home
- Provides online affordable housing listing service

### Accessible Housing

- Ensures that affordable housing is accessible to people with mobility and sensory disabilities
- Ensures that units meet the highest federal or state standards related to accessibility
- Ensures new affordable housing developments will include a minimum of 10% of its units with features needed for people with mobility disabilities and 4% of its units with features needed for people with sensory disabilities
- Requires development partners to affirmatively market their units to people with disabilities
- Provides training to property owners, developers, property management agents and other staff related to Fair Housing laws and LAHD's tenant policies

## Settlement Agreement

In January 2012, three non-profit organizations filed a complaint alleging that the City of Los Angeles and the CRA/LA failed to ensure that multifamily rental housing was accessible and made available to people with disabilities, in violation of federal and state disability and accessibility laws and regulations.

- Effective September 5, 2016, the City entered into a settlement agreement (SA) with the plaintiffs to bring the City and the Covered Housing Developments into compliance with accessibility requirements.
- The term of the SA is ten (10) years from the effective date, or when the target number of accessible units (4,000) is achieved, whichever is later.
- The Los Angeles Housing Department developed the Accessible Housing Program (AcHP) to carry out the terms of the Settlement Agreement.



## Voluntary Compliance Agreement

- Agreement reached between The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) and The City of Los Angeles (City) – Effective Date of August 2, 2019
- HUD review and approval of revisions to City’s current Fair Housing Policies Related to Disabilities for Owners and Property Management Agents, Tenant Handbook, and Appendices.
- All Los Angeles Covered Housing Developments must comply with State and Federal Accessibility Requirements, adopt and implement HUD-Approved Revised Policies and Procedures.
- Existing housing developments will be retrofitted to include accessible housing units and accessible public/common use areas.
- Future construction of accessible housing developments must include minimum percentages of accessible units – 11% Mobility, 4% Hearing/Vision



## Accessible Housing Program Overview

- Ensure Covered Housing Developments comply with federal and state accessibility standards and have required mobility and hearing/vision units
- Require Covered Housing Developments to adopt City's Fair Housing Policy Related to Disability
- Require Owners and Property Management Agents to attend the annual training Fair Housing and Compliance Policies and Procedures Workshop, including providing applicants and tenants reasonable accommodation, effective communication, and grievance policy and procedures
- Provide a grievance policy and procedures for Covered Housing Developments
- Maintain the accessible housing registry to assist individuals with disabilities to find affordable accessible housing



## Definition of Disability (California)

**An individual with a disability is:**

- Any individual who has a physical or mental disability that limits one or more major life activities
  - such as caring for oneself
  - manual tasks
  - walking
  - seeing
  - hearing
  - speaking
  - breathing
  - learning
- Any individual with a record of such an impairment; or
- Any individual regarded as having such an impairment.
- Alcoholism and past illegal drug use are considered disabilities.

**Federal and state fair housing laws prohibit housing discrimination of any sort against individuals with disabilities.**
